

If you ever get the opportunity to attend, I would highly recommend. One of the highlights from the convention was the continuous push for disposal and cull data using Maternal Plus for a future longevity EPD. Our operation has benefited from Maternal Plus by knowing the reasons for our culls, CED, BW and WW EPD's on all enrolled cows' calves prior to registration and the ability to know how our herd trends compared to the average of the Angus breed. ## From the Field with Rod Geppert

### End of the Year Sale Stats in Region 6

It's always interesting to look on how the past year went in regards to Production Bull & Female sales in Region 6. Region 6 includes Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota. The Angus breed is unique in that whatever your program needs or

wants, you can find it within the entire population of the Angus breed. Commercial cattlemen drive the direction of the entire breed, not the American Angus Association. Although the averages are very impressive, you can find whatever

you need at any price level.

It is interesting how business has changed on how we market Angus cattle. Before the internet, you had to actually attend the sale to purchase a bull, be on the phone or leave a bid with a field man With or the owner.

120 plus sales reported in Region 6 with the American Angus Association, the following stats, show how things have changed.

97.4% of all Region 6 Production Bull & Female sales offer online bidding.

88.6% of all Region 6 Production Bull & Female sales provide a video of the offering prior and during the

54.4% of all Region 6 Production Bull & Female sales do not run cattle through a ring. Only video.

34.2% of all Region 6 Production Bull & Female sales run cattle through a sale ring and provide a video.

11.4% of all Region 6 Production Bull & Female sales only run cattle in the ring with no videos.

For the 2022 Fiscal Year Sale Reporting in this region, we marketed 9,040 Registered Angus Bulls with an average of \$6,421 and 2,563 Registered Angus Females with an average of \$4,035. Nationally we marketed 51,800 Registered Angus Bulls with an average of \$5,909 and 21,395 Registered Angus Females for an average of \$6,023.

#### **Beef Leaders** Institute

The American Angus Association is in search for individuals interested in applying for the Beef Leaders Institute (BLI) program. The mission behind BLI is to provide young producers, between the ages of 25-45, the opportunity to learn more about the Association and sectors of the beef business after cattle leave the farm or ranch while networking with their peers.

The week-long event starts at the American Angus Association where participants gain a better understanding of the programs and services offered by the Association. Throughout the week stops include a feedlot operation, a beef processing plant, a food service distribution facility, and retail store. The event concludes at Certified Angus Beef® in Wooster, Ohio. Participants experience all sectors of the beef industry, interact with production experts, and develop a larger vision to not only improve their operations back home but the entire industry.

The event date for 2023 is June 12-16. Applications are due by February 15. Keep in mind, Beef Leaders Institute is limited to 20 attendees each year. The Association will provide transportation during the BLI, as well as lodging, meals, and materials. The attendees will be responsible for their round-trip transportation between



their home to Kansas City (if flying) or Saint Joseph (if driving) and their departure to home from Cleveland, Ohio (if flying) or Kansas City to get vehicle at the American Angus Association. Transportation from the Kansas City airport on both Sunday, June 11th and Friday, June 16th will be provided.

This is a once in a lifetime opportunity sponsored in part by the Angus Foundation and Certified Angus Beef®. I hope you consider submitting your application to gain a better understanding of the complete pastureto-plate experience. ### Come Sale Time, Target the Brand

Targeting the Brand™ helps identify quality herd sires.

With more data than ever on today's sire prospects, bull customers expect progress. Decisions Angus breeders made long before the gavel drops provide confidence and deliver on those anticipations.

The use of the Targeting the Brand<sup>TM</sup> logo in sale catalogs help both commercial cattlemen and seedstock producers advance their herds and orient them toward the Certified Angus Beef ® (CAB®) brand. To earn the logo, registered Angus cattle must have a minimum Marbling expected progeny difference (EPD) of +0.65 and a +55 Grid Value index (\$G). This makes it easy to identify bulls with added carcass value, and potentially more dollars for your bottom line.

Missouri Angus breeder Josh Worthington has used Targeting the Brand<sup>TM</sup> since it launched in 2017. It's a free and easy tool for his customers to quickly pick out Angus cattle that meet certain carcass quality goals.

"Our program's built on the same metrics as what Targeting the Brand™ drives," he says. Last year 71 bulls or 97% of those in the Worthington Angus sale qualified.

Across the U.S. in the fall 2021 and spring 2022 sale seasons, more than 180 sales used the logo on 6,719 bulls, up from 5,872 a year earlier.

Those results show in the growing CAB acceptance rate, currently at 36% of black-hided cattle and aiming for 50%.

More than just a marketing tool for seedstock producers, use of the logo ensures commercial customers they're choosing bulls more likely to meet goals at the feedyard and packing plant.

"This provides comfort to prospective buyers who are looking to purchase calves that will hit a high-end grid premium," Worthington says. "They have confidence when they know their set of feeder calves are sired by bulls that meet the specs for Targeting the Brand<sup>TM</sup> and have the genetic potential to make Certified Angus Beef."

Commercial cattlemen communicate the premium value by marketing Angus-sired feeder calves through AngusLink<sup>SM</sup>. Enrolling

"In the feeder calf world, we're trying to capture value ahead of harvesting those calves," Worthington says. "Anything we can do to bring in those cattle and differentiate them within the marketplace helps."

With a primary responsibility of helping customers realize more value for better carcass genetics, he invests in opportunities for customers to better understand EPDs and the impact of carcass quality.

"We're not here to just sell them a bull. We're here to sell them a bull that meets their needs and then recoup the value of that investment in genetics," Worthington says.

Bull buyers want all the information they can get to back up their decisions. Feeder calf buyers feel the same need for confidence when they bid, he says.

"Targeting the Brand™ provides that security," Worthington says. "And we are able to build greater trust with our customers."

Q: Where can I find the logo for use?

A: Download Targeting the Brand™ resources at CABcattle.com/targeting-the-brand. The logo must be applied to each individual animal that meets requirements for marbling EPD and \$G.

Q: Are cattle that meet Targeting the Brand™ requirements automatically considered "CAB qualifiers?"

A: No live cattle qualifty for Certified Angus Beef. To be eligible, cattle must be predominantly black-hided and sold through a CAB-licensed packing plant. Earning the brand requires meeting all 10 of the brand's carcass specifications as determined by a USDA grader.

Q: If a bull meets Targeting the Brand<sup>TM</sup> requirements, can my customers use the Targeting the Brand<sup>TM</sup> logo to market their feeder calves?

A: Feeder calves must be enrolled in AngusLink<sup>SM</sup> for the Genetic Merit Scorecard<sup>SM</sup> and have a 125+ grid score to tout the logo. Visit www.angus.org/anguslink for more information.

Growing up not on a ranch does not always inhibit one's exposure to production agriculture. Even though Evan Littau lives in Winner S.D., he plays an active role on his grandparent's ranch. Evan Littau is the son of Luke and Jena Littau. He has two younger sisters, Allie and Kya. His grandparents, Bob and Becky Littau, raise Angus cattle at Littau Angus Ranch.

"My favorite part about Angus cattle is the good quality beef they produce," Littau says.

As an eighth grader at Winner Middle School,

Littau is involved in football, wrestling, baseball, theatre, band, and 4-H. In 4-H, Littau shows goats, sheep, cattle, and chickens, and recently served as club treasurer. When he is not at school or at his grandparent's ranch, Littau enjoys shooting archery. He is a member of the Tripp County Range Robins, which is a competitive archery team.

Littau's grandparents gifted him a heifer when he was a baby to help him begin his herd. He retains the money from selling the calves to grow his college fund. Littau enjoys calving season in addition to turning the ranch's 400 cow-calf pairs out to pasture. The older Littau gets, the more responsibilities he is given on the farm.

"In the feeder calf world, we're trying to capture value ahead of harvesting those calves," Worthington says. "Anything we can do to bring in those cattle and differentiate them within the marketplace helps."

With a primary responsibility of helping customers realize more value for better carcass genetics, he invests in opportunities for customers to better understand EPDs and the impact of carcass quality.

"We're not here to just sell them a bull. We're here to sell them a bull that meets their needs and then recoup the value of that investment in genetics," Worthington says.

Bull buyers want all the information they can get to back up their decisions. Feeder calf buyers feel the same need for confidence when they bid, he says.

"Targeting the Brand<sup>TM</sup> provides that security," Worthington says. "And we are able to build greater trust with our customers.



## **Treating Customers with Honesty:** Secret of Success for Palmquist Angus

The Palmquists are mainstays of the Angus breed in the state of South Dakota and have been for decades. Having been in the cattle ranching and farming business for 66 years, Clayton Palmquist knows a thing or two about cattle, and Registered Angus is the

be the favorite for this cattle owner.

#### Over the Years

It all started as a 4-H beef project in 1956, when Palmquist bought two Registered Angus calves from another breeder. Palmquist served in the United States Army during the Vietnam crisis from 1964-1967. After returning home from the military, he bought an additional 56 bred cows. Today, the Palmquist herd has grown to a respectable 140 Registered Angus and commercial cows on 1,600 acres located near Wilmot, S.D. Clayton and his wife, Kathleen, run the operation and have hired additional labor for the cattle business. Their son, Collin, and his fami-

breed that has proven to ly also come from Watertown to pitch in when needed.

> Clayton says that treating customers honestly has been the family's secret to success all these years—and it has paid dividends.

#### **Many Benefits**

"We prefer Registered Angus for their fertility, high market demand, easy calving that results in more live calves, efficient production capability and extra pounds at weaning," he says. "We've selected bulls to breed our females to that have easy calving while also increasing quality grade, such as Capitalist, Reflection, Timeless and Werner War Party."

The Palmquists strive to improve their Registered Angus cattle by improving calving, maternal traits and rapid gain once calves reach the feedlot.

First calf heifers are bred to calve out in the spring, starting around March 15, followed by the rest of the females calving out after April 1.

Cows are allowed to graze cornstalks in the fall, and the winter ration is typically corn silage, ground hay and alfalfa.

"With the drought this year, we'll also be feeding oats over the winter," Palmquist adds. "Our herd grazes native pasture during the summer months."

The Palmquists market their cattle by utilizing local advertising to sell breeding stock. Calves are sold on the grid to a feedlot cattle,

ending up with one of the Tyson packing plants. However, like all Western cattle producers, the Palmquist herd has been impacted by the drought.

"We rotate pastures every week and have had to increase the use of cornstalks as winter feed," he says. "My old saying is that creek water and cornstalks plus Registered Angus cows produces excellent beef."

#### Special Achievements

Raising Registered Angus cattle has brought the Palmquist family prosperity and a great life for raising and enjoying their family. Clayton Palmquist is a lifetime member of the American Angus Association. In 1993, Collin was awarded state honors in the National 4-H Beef project. Clayton and Kathleen's daughter, Jennifer, served honorably as South Dakota Angus Queen in 1986.

The family also enjoyed success in the Registered Angus showring back in the 1980s, both locally and nationally. Their showring success included exhibiting the 1984 Grand Champion Angus Female at the Sioux Empire Farm Show and the 1985 Grand Champion Steer at the Watertown Farm Show.

"We've also shown many years at the National Western Stock Show in Denver," Clayton adds. "We've shown at the South Dakota State Fair for 65 years."

#### **Looking Forward**

As the Palmquist Angus operation moves into the third decade of the 21st century, they plan to continue improving the quality of their Registered Angus herd and their production practices. They have struggled with the same challenges that all South Dakota Angus breeders are facing, including inflation, high fuel costs, taxes and increasing costs for repairs and everyday expenses on the

"The Angus breed has a great future," Clayton says. "Inflation has hurt demand for beef. We spend winters in Arizona, and I often watch and talk to customers at the meat counter in grocery stores. Many have said that they buy chicken now rather than beef due to inflation."

### Parentage required!

Perhaps the single most problematic phone call we receive in the Member Services department revolves around unavailable DNA necessary to meet a registration requirement.

Without the DNA submission, parentage markers are not available, and the registration requirement cannot be met. DNA samples need to be submitted to extract parentage markers to have on file at the American Angus Association.

This is typically associated with donor females flushed in the past where embryos were created and frozen for future use.

In the event a donor female unexpectedly dies or is culled from the herd and the breeder fails to realize DNA is required on all donor dams, the necessary parentage markers required to meet the registration rules would not be available. Unfortunately, the resulting embryo transfer (ET) calves would not meet the rule requirements and registrations would not be allowed.

This leaves the breeder extremely frustrated and unable to register the resulting ET calves.

#### Parentage rules

The parentage rules associated with required DNA are simple and clear and can be found in several locations within the Breeder's Reference Guide. It is important to remember two basic rules for DNA and subsequent parentage markers required for registrations:

1. All sires permitted for artificial insemination (AI) must be DNA-marker-typed with the Association.

2. All donor dams must be DNA-marker-typed with the Association.

From the Breeder's Reference Guide definitions section, we find in the context of parentage testing, DNA Marker Typing means the animal in question has had a blood, hair, tissue, semen or other biological sample collected; DNA has been extracted; and extracted

DNA has been used to determine the genotype for bovine parentage markers as defined by the International Society for Animal Genetics (ISAG). Extraction and genotyping must be conducted by an Association-approved laboratory.

The requirement for AI sires is typically not an issue, as a previously collected straw of semen can be sent for parentage marker extraction. It is not that convenient with donor dams, and once they are gone, so goes the DNA availability.

#### **Inferred Parentage** process

In the event a donor female is unavailable for DNA sampling, the Association does offer a service to work backwards to get parentage verification. This process is called the "Inferred Parentage" pro-

If there is sufficient DNA on enough unrelated progeny (different sires represented), parent verification can be possible. The Association makes no guarantee this effort will be successful, but we do offer the service as a last resort for those cases with unavailable DNA.

The inferred process calls for a minimum of four progeny to get the markers high enough using current DNA technology. In some cases, this process requires more than four progeny, depending on the genetic relationships. In addition, we must have at least one known parent with parentage markers on file.

This procedure requires progeny and does not allow the use of collateral relatives. The inferred marker process does come with an additional fee, plus the original fee for parentage on each submitted calf.

For example, if a donor has expired without DNA collection and the breeder has requested the inferred process on the donor female, the Association would need samples on four progeny of the donor female and would require parentage markers to be on file on all four of the sires of these calves.

Another example would be the opposite — if the sire was expired without DNA secured and the breeder was requesting to infer the sire, we would require four progeny from the sire, and all four of the dams of these four progeny would need to have parentage markers on file with the Association.

#### Remember to collect **DNA** samples

The Member Services department only offers the inferred process as a last resort, as a DNA sample is always preferred. The resources invested in creating these resulting ET calves can be substantial, please do not overlook this necessary step.

Remember to get DNA samples collected on each donor female in your program and keep a second sample at your farm or ranch as insurance.

information to increase income for beef producers and allied agri-business professionals.

"This year's short, power-packed program features strategies to improve the profitability of the feedlot enterprise," she said. "We also have more than 20 sponsors with cutting edge technologies to help enhance feedlot returns."

Zach Smith, assistant professor in animal science at South Dakota State University, will begin the day by sharing research on best management practices to enhance the feeding value of high moisture corn and earlage. With the accelerated cost of feed, maximizing nutritional quality of feed is an effective way to improve cattle performance and reduce the number of days cattle are on feed.

There will be multiple other speakers that day including topics on manure management and markets.



### Beef Industry Panel Shares Insight on Future Challenges and Opportunities

*Perspectives* from all sectors were discussed in the panel at the 2022 Angus Convention

Cattlemen and women from across the United States work in different sectors of the beef industry, deal with different environmental issues and have different business strategies. But at the end of the day, all farmers and ranchers work toward the same goal; to continue raising and selling the best beef possible.

Raising top-quality beef comes with both barriers and optimism. During the 2022 Angus Convention first general session, Exploring Your Potential, five Angus breeders and industry experts spoke on a panel

American Angus Association® chief executive officer, as the moderator. The panel took place November 5 in Salt Lake City, Utah.

The panel included the following backgrounds and perspectives: Jerry Connealy with Connealy Angus; Mark Gardiner with Gardiner Angus Ranch and U.S. Premium Beef; Ed Greiman with Greiman Brothers and Upper Iowa Beef: Joe Goggins with Vermillion Ranch and Northern Livestock Video Auction; and Matt Perrier with Dalebanks Angus.

Big opportunities lie ahead for the industry, the panelists said. Perrier spoke about the importance of influence and the next generation. Greiman discussed how vital it is for producers to continually improve quality so packers can

with Mark McCully, find new ways to add value to the carcass. The type of supplies and increasing packing capacity brought excitement to Goggins, and Connealy shared his perspective about the value of Association tools.

> "It's full circle. The American Angus Association provides the tools, and you guys [producers] have obviously done a tremendous job using those tools making a premium as demand has gone up," said Connealy. "But there is still upside that we can get better. We can always get better."

Vertical coordination is also an answer to improving the beef industry while avoiding vertical integration said Gardiner. He defines vertical integration as an entity owning things from the cut of beef all the way to the genetics.

"The only way we keep that from happening, in my opinion, is through vertical coordination and passing that information, building those alliances, sharing and being transparent with whoever it is we sell product to and with who they sell product to," said Gardiner.

Perhaps the biggest challenge, the cattlemen said, is ensuring that

beef industry profitability is spread over all segments of the industry. In the past, when one segment made money, the others lost it -the "skin thy neighbor approach," as Gardiner put it.

The panelists talked about the value and quality of Angus beef creating more profitability. Perrier mentioned a quote from John Stika,

Certified Angus Beef® president, who said the only new money in the beef industry comes from the consumer. If that is the case, we must ensure there is opportunity to make money through consumer demand, said


Increasing consumer demand also means increasing consumer trust, which Connealy said is the most significant barrier to the industry's future success. If we don't do the right things, or represent our cattle and our industry correctly, consumer trust could drag us down, he said.

Pull-through demand for Certified Angus Beef® is key. As long as we can keep that, he said, "We will come out on top. I am confident in that."

The group's morale was bullish as they considered environmental and economic factors influencing profitability of producers in the coming years. Considering the market's improvement and opportunity, the group also recognized the effect rising input costs will have on cattle prices. Greiman discussed how producers should use the tools and resources available to them as prices swing. Risk management was a tool discussed as well as a genetic hedge—or the ability to protect yourself through the use of good genetics.


The Angus breed is positioned well to help with that, Perrier said. "We have one breed that can do what we do from an end product, growth standpoint and yet still have a pasture full of females that are going to make the producer money."

As the Angus breed and beef industry work toward a successful future, the panel reminded attendees how everyone is facing the same challenges and opportunities. Regardless of size and shape, there is room for success and probability of cattle producers.



## S.D. Big Sioux River Watershed Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program opens

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the State of South Dakota are expanding their partnership through the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) to assist South Dakota farmers, ranchers and agricultural landowners in improving water quality, reducing soil erosion, enhancing wildlife habitat, and creating public hunting and fishing access. The Big Sioux River Watershed CREP, offered by USDA and the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish & Parks, (SD GF&P) expands the voluntary, incentive-based conservation programs available to South Dakota agricultural producers and focuses on the Big Sioux River watershed. Enrollment for the South Dako-

ta CREP opened November 1, 2022.

"CREP is one of our most flexible tools when it comes to voluntary, locally led, partner-driven conservation efforts, and we're so glad that we're able to put it to work in South Dakota," said Steve Dick, USDA Farm Service Agency State Director in South Dakota. "This initiative will have a positive impact in South Dakota. and we look forward to broadening the reach of the program to new agricultural producers and landscapes. We are so grateful to have support from South Dakota leaders to make this program possible."

"Landowners and producers in the Big Sioux River watershed are eligible for this program,"

said Kevin Robling, GFP Secretary. "The difference between CREP and CRP is that public hunting and fishing access is required on CREP enrolled acres and participants receive a higher total payment than if they just enroll in CRP."

Through the South Dakota CREP, federal and state resources are made available to program participants to voluntarily enroll in CRP contracts and public land access agreements with the State of South Dakota for 10-to-15-years. Participants restore cropland and marginal pastureland to grasses, wetlands, or other approved vegetation. This will improve water quality by reducing sediment, nutrients, nitrogen, and other pollutants from entering

streams and rivers, and enhance wildlife habitat in the project area. In return, FSA provides participants with cost-share assistance and annual rental payments, and SD GF&P provides an additional annual rental payment for the enrolled acres open to walk-in public hunting and fishing access.

Eligible practices include permanent wildlife habitat, filter strips, wetland restorations, rare and declining habitat for prairie, duck nesting habitat, prairie strips, marginal pastureland wildlife habitat buffers, and marginal pastureland buffers.

"We are excited to partner with SD GF&P to offer this great watershed conservation incentive for South Dakota landowners and producers," Dick said. "Working together, we can deliver critical environmental benefits through voluntary conservation efforts, enhance agricultural productivity, and improve water quality in South Dakota, the Big Sioux River watershed, and downstream."

The South Dakota CREP includes all or portions of the following 18 counties in the Big Sioux River Watershed: Brookings, Clark, Clay, Codington, Day, Deuel, Grant, Hamlin, Kingsbury, Lake, Lincoln, Marshall, McCook, Minnehaha, Moody, Roberts, Turner, and Union counties.

Eligible participants can qualify for annual rental payments, cost share for installing the approved conservation practices, and incentive payments for certain practices. In addition, SD GF&P will provide eligible participants additional annual rental payment.

Interested farmers, ranchers, and agricultural landowners are encouraged to contact the Farm Service Agency (FSA) at their local USDA Service Center, a Pheasants Forever Farm Bill Biologist, or GFP private lands habitat biologist to learn more or to participate. ## Classic Beef Wellington

Recipe courtesy of Beef Loving Texans Total time: 1 hour, 30 minutes Servings: 4

- 1 teaspoon olive oil, divided
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper, divided
- chateaubriand tenderloin roast
- 8 ounces mushrooms
- 1 large shallot
- 2 tablespoons dry red wine
- 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
- teaspoon dried thyme leaves flour
- 1 sheet puff pastry



In large nonstick skillet over medium-high heat, heat 1/2 teaspoon oil until hot. Combine salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Press evenly onto all surfaces of roast. Place roast in skillet; brown evenly. Remove roast from skillet.

Heat oven to 425 F. In food processor, pulse mushrooms and shallot about 10 times until finely chopped.

Do not overprocess.

Place same skillet used for roast over medium-high heat and heat remaining oil until hot. Add mushrooms and shallot; cook 4-6 minutes until tender and all liquid is evaporated, stirring often. Add wine; cook 2-3 minutes until all liquid is evaporated. Stir in mustard,

thyme and remaining pepper. Cook 2-3 minutes. Remove from skillet to medium bowl; Line rimmed baking sheet with aluminum foil and place in oven. On lightly floured cutting board, unfold pastry dough. Roll pastry out to 12-by-9-inch rectangle; lay dough with shortest edge toward you. Spread mushroom mixture onto pastry dough, leaving 1/2inch border around edges. Place roast in center of mushrooms. Fold pastry dough neatly

Remove baking sheet from oven and dust lightly with flour. Place pastry-wrapped roast, seam-side down, on baking sheet. Cut four (2-inch) vents in top of pastry.

around roast, stretching dough if necessary. Cut off excess pastry dough; press to seal

Bake 35-50 minutes, or until golden brown and instant-read thermometer inserted into center of roast registers 135 F for medium-rare or 150 F for medium. Transfer roast to carving board. Let stand 10 minutes. Temperature will rise about 10 F to reach 145 F for medium-rare or 160F for medium.

Carve into slices and serve.

### Top Sirloin Roast with Herb Garlic Peppercorn Crust

Recipe courtesy of Beef Loving Texans Total time: 45 minutes Servings: 8

- 1 center-cut sirloin beef roast (about 3 pounds)
- 1 tablespoon olive oil

#### **Seasoning:**

- 2 teaspoons kosher salt
- 2 tablespoons fresh parsley, chopped
- tablespoons fresh thyme, chopped
- cloves garlic, minced
- 2 teaspoons coarsely ground mixed peppercorns (black, white, green and pink)

Preheat oven to 350 F.

Rub roast with olive oil.

To make seasoning: In small bowl, combine salt, parsley, thyme, garlic and mixed peppercorns; press evenly into beef roast.

Place roast in roasting pan or baking dish with wire rack in bottom. Bake 40-60 minutes. Remove roast when meat thermometer registers 135 F for medium-rare or 150 F for medium.

Transfer roast to carving board; tent loosely with aluminum foil. Let stand 10-15 minutes. Temperature will rise about 10 F to reach

145 F for medium-rare or 160 F for medium. Carve roast into slices by cutting against grain.


